FROM THE MANSE. . . Remembering

Dear Friends, November is a month traditionally known for remembering...

"Remember, remember the fifth of November, Gunpowder treason and plot. We see no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot!"

We also pause on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month to remember with thanksgiving, those who lived and died in the service of our country; and to ask for God's help and blessing, that we may be worthy of their sacrifice each day of our life.

During worship in October we have been journeying with Moses through Exodus. Remembering the difficulties, the hardships, the regrets, the doubts faced by the Israelites as God saves them from slavery in Egypt. We see that God has a plan, and how even giving daily food and water, providing for their every need the Israelites still grumble and complain; at times even wishing they could go back to the old days in Egypt. But God has a plan for them. A plan of a country filled with milk and honey, if only they would just place their trust totally in him and follow his commandments. Well, nothing much changes there, we are still doing this. Perhaps we need to remember that like the Israelites pilgrimage through the desert that we are on our own journey with God, following Jesus and empowered by the Holy Spirit. We are God's Holy people of the 21st century and like the Israelites we need to listen and follow where God leads us.

Moses led his people out of slavery after the Passover and Jesus is the new sacrificial lamb who died once and for all for the forgiveness of sins. We need to look to Jesus to His leadership, His ways.

We see that Jesus chose 12 disciples but within that group He had an inner circle of 3, Peter, James and John, whom Jesus invested His time in more than the others, who He took with him into the most spiritual and testing of situations like the Transfiguration and Gethsemane.

Path of Renewal suggests we look back, we Remember Jesus' leadership pattern and reflect that in today's situations. Remembering the strengths of Jesus' relationships and model of living and engaging in the world. It worked for Jesus, why not in today's 21st century? As we seek a new way of living and serving in our needy world, let's be ready to look back on the way of Jesus, seeking his strength and a closer relationship with Him in the days ahead.



Editor's Extras

Since our last issue I have attended the "Introduction to Mindfulness" course held in the Church Hall under the auspices of Nikki Kidd. This involved clearing the mind of work and worry and to be at Peace with ourselves for ten or twenty minutes. After this time considerations and priorities became clearer. It worked for me. It also occurred to me that we could use this in our Spiritual Life - clear our minds of the everyday and concentrate on our relationship with God, perhaps through Prayer. It might help at this time of Remembrance to highlight the past and the future. Through this magazine we can give thanks for those significant events in our Church lives which we wish to treasure. Kirk Session Report

Apart from the normal business of the Session (much of which can be found elsewhere in the magazine), the main points of interest centred round forward thinking - Youth Organisations visited by Youth Co-Ordinator, who produced a favourable report. It was agreed that the Church should provide more information and photographs to the Rutherglen Reformer to promote our Youth activities to attract more young people to our Church. Path of Renewal will be given some precedence, by using Jesus' example in Discipleship, with training courses and within Church Services. Visitations, by Elders, to the various organisations were distributed. The Presbytery Elder reported the salient points discussed over the last two months. A Minister has been ordained at Eastwood Church, thus releasing Sandra from her work as Interim Moderator. "Fresh Expressions" related to the Ministry as part of Path of Renewal. This is a mission to attract members by promoting the Church or altering our current procedures (e.g., having a weekday Service to accommodate changes in lifestyle). The World Mission report centred on Climate Change and the current famine in Malawi, explained in a leaflet "People of the Way". The Scottish Churches Anti-Human Trafficking Group Convenor gave a harrowing report on the buying and selling of humans and the various consequences for these folk - a leaflet was provided. At the regional meeting there was a discussion regarding Discipline within the Church ranging from minor complaints to major incidents, and the machinery and time taken - there were many questions - in contemplation and resolution. The Role of the Elder was considered - the expectations and perhaps, expansion of duties in this time of fewer ministers.

Congregational Board Report

For financial situation, see Congregational Finance in this issue. A letter was sent to Presbytery regarding our contribution to Ministries and Mission taking our financial position into account but so far, to no avail. A "pool" of money should be set aside for incidental repairs and renewals and employees remuneration was determined. On the Property Front, sadly Angus Law has stepped down as Convenor, and Lawson Boyd will oversee property issues on a temporary basis.

The floor in the Lesser Hall is to be refurbished; the vinyl in the foyer leading to halls replaced and the Office is to be transferred to the Lounge. Urgent repairs to the flashing at the South Transept were agreed. Water proofing is required on various parts of our roofs at a major cost. This requires permission of Glasgow Presbytery in respect of utilisation of buildings. Tax recovered through the Gift Aid system is progressing satisfactorily. Thanks were given to those who administer the scheme. Note, standing order forms can be found at the front door of the Church. The new Garden at the side of the Church is taking shape. No grant is currently available, perhaps not until April, for the purchase of a defibrillator, so this has been deferred till a later date.

ASPECTS OF OUR CHURCH ... Remembrance

Remembrance Sunday, is a day for the nation to remember and honour those who have sacrificed themselves to secure and protect our freedom. Remembrance Sunday ensures that no-one is forgotten as the nation unites to honour all who have suffered or died in war.

Remembrance Day, sometimes known informally as **Poppy Day**, is a memorial day observed in the Commonwealth of Nations member states since the end of the First World War to remember the members of their armed forces who have died in the line of duty. Following a tradition inaugurated by King George V in 1919, the day is also marked by war remembrances in many non-Commonwealth countries. Remembrance Day is observed on 11 November in most countries to recall the end of hostilities of World War I on that date in 1918. Hostilities formally ended "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month", in accordance with the armistice signed by representatives of Germany and the Entente between 5:12 and 5:20 that morning. The First World War officially ended with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles on 28 June 1919.

The memorial evolved out of Armistice Day, which continues to be marked on the same date. The initial Armistice Day was observed at Buckingham Palace, commencing with King George V hosting a "Banquet in Honour of the President of the French Republic" during the evening hours of 10 November 1919. The first official Armistice Day was subsequently held on the grounds of Buckingham Palace the following morning.

The red remembrance poppy has become a familiar emblem of Remembrance Day due to the poem "In Flanders Fields" written by Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae. After reading the poem, Moina Michael, a professor at the University of Georgia, wrote the poem, "We Shall Remember," and swore to wear a red poppy on the anniversary. The custom spread to Europe and the countries of the British Empire and Commonwealth within three years. Madame Anne E. Guerin tirelessly promoted the practice in Europe and the British Empire. In the UK Major George Howson fostered the cause with the support of General Haig. Poppies were worn for the first time at the 1921 anniversary ceremony. At first real poppies were worn. These poppies bloomed across some of the worst battlefields of Flanders in World War I; their brilliant red colour became a symbol for the blood spilled in the war.

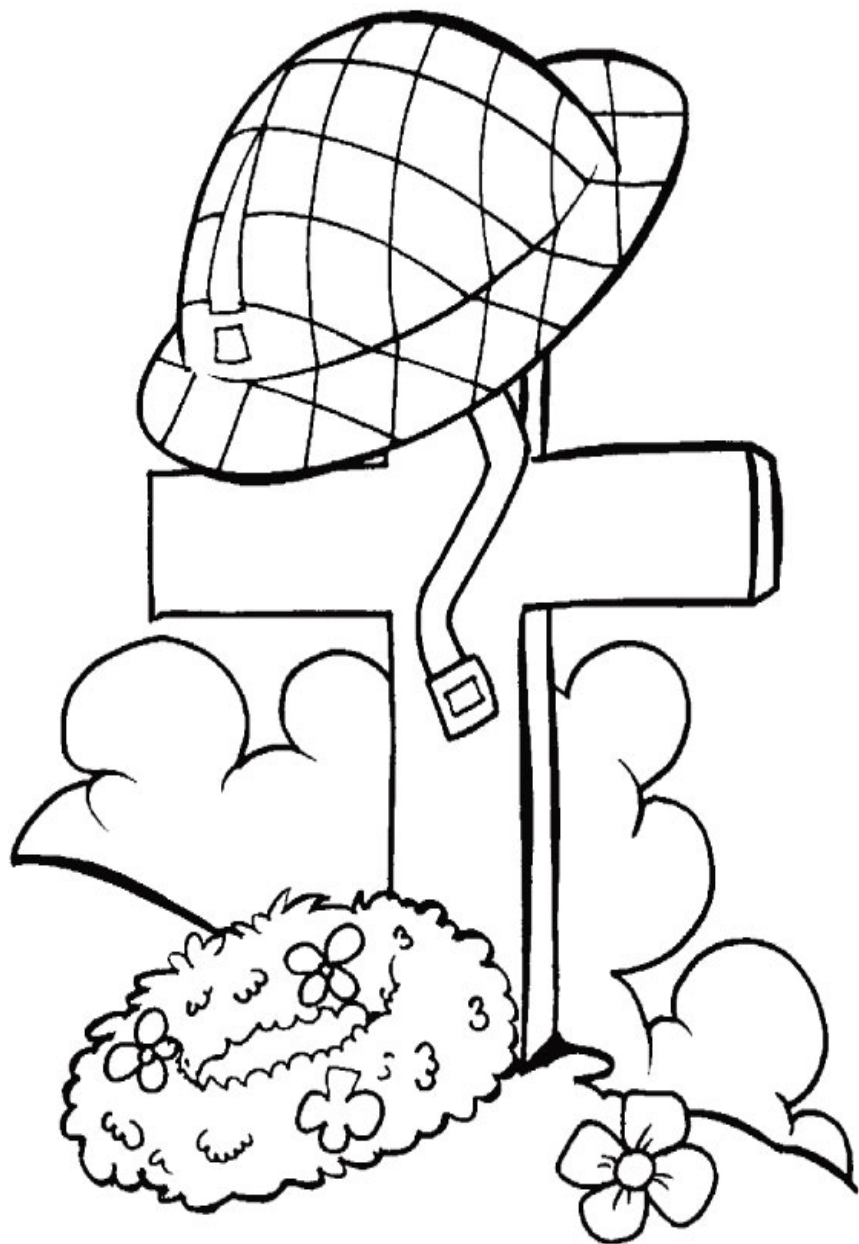


MINDFULNESS THANKS

Hamed's Story:

I was born in 1981 in Iran. I grew up in a Muslim family of three brothers, I am the middle one. I married my wife nine years ago and we have one son called Karen.

I lived in Rasht City and went to School and University there, my favourite hobbies are fishing and football. I worked as a gas inspector for 12 years. About a year ago I learned about Jesus through my friend. I read more about Him through the Bible and saw a film about Him, I felt my faith growing and my life was being blessed with His love. I attended an underground Church in Iran where we prayed and studied the bible.

It is extremely difficult to practise your faith as an Iranian Christian and I was prosecuted by Government authorities for converting to Christianity. This led me into leaving my country. I did not know where I was going but I put my life in Jesus hands, I asked Him to take me somewhere safe. When I arrived in the UK the Home Office sent me to Glasgow. I did not know anything about the people of Glasgow, only that there were two famous football teams. However I have found the people in Glasgow to be very caring and the city very beautiful.

One day I got lost and was passing King's Park Church, I decided to go to this Church the next Sunday. The first time I came to King's Park was the 21st of August, a very memorable day for me. I received such a warm welcome from dear Aileen and kind Sandra. I also received a lovely welcome from Raymond, Wilson, Lawson, Rosemary, Michael, Ian & Nancy, Sheena, Dot, Colin and many others whose names I do not know. I have such a good feeling about King's Park and have spent the best time there. Even though I am thousands of miles away from my family and miss them a lot I do not feel lonely within the family of King's Park. I would like to say thank you to all the people in the Church and the biggest thanks to Jesus for sending me here. I pray that He will give me strength to learn more about Him and spread His message, I pray to be reunited with my wife and son and to Bless our Church and people. Amen.
