Whole Church Conference Outcomes

I think we can all agree that we had a very productive time at the conference on the 26th October. The feedback that I got from those who attended the conference was positive and I promised that I would get some information back to those who gave of their time and energy to come along and take part.

We looked at what we did well and what could be better in 6 areas and the comments which repeatedly came up are as follows:

Worship:

Works well - Welcoming, variety of services, friendship/fellowship, worship pattern works

Could be better – Not enough congregational participation, lack of togetherness, spread out in church

Committees:

Works Well - Certain committees are known and work well.

Could be better - Some committees don't meet, little feedback from committees to congregation.

Pastoral Care:

Works well – Pastoral care from Minister and Pastoral Assistant, regular visits & care of the elderly and prayer.

Could be better: Communication and lack of involvement in pastoral care.

Community / Mission:

Works well – Wide variety of community events, Hall lets and relationships with neighbours and shops.

Youth:

Works well – Contact with schools, Messy Church, Staff Leaders, Youth Organisations (Local Community Centre)

Could do better – Parent's not bringing children, do other things on a Sunday, same Sunday school regime, Transition times, lack of interest.

Eldership:

Works Well – contact and communication with all members, those attending and non-attenders, Kirk Session meetings and visitations to groups.

Could do better – lack of interest, communication, and rapport with district, visibility and more discussion at Kirk Session meetings.

This is the feedback from parts 1&2 and part 3 will require further in depth discussion in order to take things forward and so these will go to working groups to develop. Thank you so much to all those who participated.

Editor's Extras

October—when changes occur; when the nights start "drawing in"; when the organisations have restarted and the Church "clock" signals a new session. There are changes, also, to the magazine which will be produced every two months but more of that separately in this issue. In the Church, anniversaries don't alter (remember Harvest Thanksgiving, and look to BB Founders' Day and Remembrance Sunday amongst others), but what must not change is the Church's focus in its message to the community. One aspect not in doubt is the dedication and commitment of Church members even though there seems to be fewer every year. There will be changes in the future which will have to be coped with, within the Church. GENERAL ASSEMBLY SUMMARY

The following is a brief indication of the topics discussed at this year's Assembly and gives an insight into the scope of possible future actions within the Church and its involvement in the Community. Actions within the Church and its involvement in the Community:

- Same sex marriages
- Path of Renewal cultural changes causing "missional mindset"
- Ministry—training experienced Elders to preach and preside at Sacraments
- Mission Role and Status of Women in the World Church, their contribution is massive despite discrimination
- Church & Society asylum seekers, refugees, politics, social justice etc, create targets over the next 10 years.
- Social Care—work of Crossreach to initiate procedures to keep the Church's chosen charity involved in the community
- Ecumenical
 – discussions and relationships with other churches

Also reviewed were World Missions, Guild, Safeguarding and Chaplaincy to the Forces - all of which were making good progress.

About £5 goes to the Parish Ministries Fund – this ensures we have ministries in every part of the country.

And the 80p?

It supports congregations with services such as Safeguarding, Law Department, General Trustees and Stewardship & Finance. It also ensures the mission of the Church is strengthened through the work of Councils:-

7p - Mission and Discipleship, 4p - Church and Society, 6p - Social Care (Crossreach), 11p - World Mission, 40p - Support and Services to your church (legal advice, accounting, safeguarding), 5p - General Assembly and Moderator, 7p-Special Contributions.

Along with the gift envelope there is also a Standing Order in this month's magazine, for those who do not already have a standing order set up this can be completed and handed into your bank. If, of course you already have a Standing Order set up you can renew your giving at any time.

PLACES OF THE BIBLE

Gaza Also called Azzah, which is its Hebrew name meaning strong. It was a city on the Mediterranean Sea, remarkable for its early importance as the chief centre of the great commercial traffic with Egypt. Its earliest inhabitants were the Avims who were conquered and displaced by the Caphtorims (Duet 2:23), a Philistine Tribe. In the division of land the Lot of Gaza fell to Judah (Josh 15:47). It was the southern most of the five great Philistine cities which each gave a Golden Emerod as a guilt offering to the Lord (1 Sam 6:17). Aldous Huxley wrote a novel called "Eveless in Gaza" which must be a reference to the story of Samson (Judges 13 to Judges 16); his destiny (to save Israel from the Philistines); his marriage and divorce (wife given to best man); his retribution (carried away the gates of the city); of Delilah (to find the secret of his strength); being blinded, imprisoned and made to grind corn and pulling down the Temple in Gaza. Jerimiah, Amos and Zephinian denounce the Judgements of God against it. It is mentioned in Acts 8:26 when Philip is told to take the road from Jerusalem to Gaza through the Gaza desert.

Jericho - A place of Fragrance - No doubt those who visited the Holy Land will be able to give a current opinion regarding Jericho but the following is the history. A fenced city in the midst of palm trees in the plain of Jordan, over where the Israelites crossed the river (Josh 3:16). Its site was near Elisha's Fountain (Kings 2: 19-22) about five miles west of Jordan. It was the strongest fortress in Canaan and the key to Western Palestine. The city was taken in remarkable fashion by the Israelites - with trumpets (Joshua 6) as the old song goes "Joshua fought the Battle of Jericho and the walls came tumbling down". God gave it into their hands. The Victors destroyed the city and plundered it of its silver and gold for the Lord's Treasury (Num 31: 5-54). The city was given to the Tribe of Benjamin and was inhabited at the time of Judges (Jud 3:13). It is not mentioned again till the time of David. It was rebuilt again as a fortified City by Hiel (1 Kings 16:34). In the New Testament, Jericho stood some distance to the South East of the ancient one and was a flourishing place. It was here that Jesus gave sight to two blind men (Matt 20: 29-34), (Mark 10:46-52) and brought salvation to Zaccheus, a publican (Luke 19:2-10), Jericho's chequered history continues. It was destroyed by the Turks in 1840. However, the soil is fertile, there is an abundance of water although the climate

is hot and unhealthy as the plain is 1200 feet below sea level. It is still a major tourist attraction today.

There was an absolute faith in God by Joshua and Samson that they would be supported in their endeavours even though death occurred in both cases. There was an absolute faith in God by Jesus to allow healing and salvation to the blind men and Zaccheus with the resultant good. This surely illustrates the "dual thinking" regarding faith in our world today.
