

Comments

November - Shortfall in overall income after expenses was £5,839. Of this, there was a shortfall in Unrestricted Funds of £5,472 for the month (although £1,520 of this is temporary use of cash for Bazaar set up cost and floats and is repaid in December)

December - Surplus of income after expenses was £9,635. Generous donations of approx £6,500 were received during the month. * Christmas Bazaar Cash banked in December was £5,212 however £1,520 cash at end of November was used for set up costs and floats. Net surplus from Christmas Bazaar was £3,692.

CHURCH OFFICER.....or not?

It was reported in December17/January18 magazine that Michael Madden had resigned as our church officer, and that a working group had been appointed to consider the future of the post. That group reported to a meeting of trustees after the December Communion. It made the following recommendations:-

Rather than employ a church officer to cover the previous “split-shift” contract hours, it was proposed that a new cleaner/caretaker position should be introduced to work 9am – 1pm on Monday, Friday, Saturday & Sunday.

The evening “shifts”, comprising 6pm – 10pm on Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, would be covered by volunteers from the congregation (Monday nights are already covered by a volunteer rota). This would save money and help considerably in reducing our significant financial deficit. The working group’s proposals were duly ratified by the trustees and you will be aware that the new position has recently been advertised.

Michael left his position at the beginning of November, and I’m pleased to say that in keeping with the subsequent volunteering proposals, a few people came forward, generally to cover a particular preferred evening on a monthly basis through November, December and into January. I am indebted to these volunteers but must point out that for the set up to be successful in the long term, **WE NEED MORE VOLUNTEERS.**

You will be aware that an important part of the church officer’s duties was to attend to all church services – the formal entry and exit of the bible, and various other preparatory tasks on a Sunday. If anyone would be able to help carry out these duties on an occasional Sunday, this would also be most appreciated.

So to recap – we need volunteers urgently:-

- **to look after the use of the halls, etc on a Tuesday or Wednesday or Thursday evening, and/or to carry out “beadle” duties on an occasional Sunday morning/ evening**

Leonard Cheshire Disability is a charity that supports disabled people in the UK and around the world to fulfil their potential and live the lives they choose. We have several supported living houses across Glasgow, including in Castlemilk. The people who live in these houses, lead independent lives with the support of our staff. Additionally we involve volunteer befrienders to offer support in different ways. In our Castlemilk service we have a couple of gentlemen who love country music and would like a volunteer or two to visit them in their home to share music with them; after a while this might extend to trips out and about, perhaps even to see live music. If you live locally, like country music and would like to gain experience of working with people with a disability, then you might be who we are looking for. Places of the Bible Towns and cities where faith in action took place through the works of Jesus.

Capernaum—Nahum's Town

A Galilean City frequently mentioned in the history of our Lord. It is not mentioned in the Old Testament. After our Lord's expulsion from Nazareth, Capernaum became his "own city". It was the scene of many acts and incidents in his life - healing of the servant boy (Matt 8:5) - healing Peter's mother-in-law (Matt 8:14,15) - healing of paralysed boy (Matt 9:2-6) - healing the sick (Mark 1:32-34) etc. The unbelief of the inhabitants after evidence of His mission brought down a heavy denunciation of Judgement on them (Matt 11:23). Capernaum stood on the Western shore of the Sea of Galilee and lay on the Great Highway from Damascus to Acco and Tyre. There are extensive ruins, also the remains of what must have been a beautiful synagogue where our Lord gave the well-known discourse on Bread of Life (John 6).

Bethany - House of Dates

This was a village on the South-Eastern slope of the Mount of Olives (Mark 11:1) about 2 miles east of Jerusalem on the Road to Jericho, It derived its name from the number of palm-trees which grew there. It was residence of Lazarus and his sisters. It is frequently mentioned in connection with memorable incidents in the life of our Lord. He was at the home of Simon the Leper where the woman anointed Him with expensive perfume (Matt 26:6 and Mark 14:3). Also on the road from Emmaus to Bethany (Luke 24:50) and the raising of Lazarus (John 11:1). The village has been described as "remarkably beautiful", the perfection of seclusion and peace.

Bethphage - House of the Unripe Fig

Mainly known for the place that the colt was tied before Jesus's triumphal entry to Jerusalem (Matt 21:1, Mark 11:1, Luke 19:29). It was very close to Bethany.

Bethsaida - House of Fish

There may have been two places called Bethsaida, or , perhaps as some suppose, only one built on both sides of the Sea of Tiberius near where the Jordan enters it. It was the native place of Peter, Andrew and Philip (John 1:44) and was frequently visited by Jesus. It was also where Jesus walked on water (Mark 6:45). A city near where Jesus fed the 5000 and a blind man had his sight restored (Luke 9:10) and (Mark 8:22)
