# FROM THE MANSE. . . Watch this church!

For some months now all that can be heard from houses throughout Kings Park and beyond is the clickety click of knitting needles. Red wool and garden canes have been flying from shelves and garden centres, supporting the army of devoted servants who have knitted to date well over fifteen hundred poppies and they are still going strong. Thank you to everyone who has helped in any way. The garden of Remembrance this year will be a sea of red poppies covering the whole of our garden marking the 100th Anniversary of the end of the First World War - "The War to end all Wars". This year we wanted to do something special to mark this very special anniversary, lest we forget!

Each year we promise to remember those who laid down their lives so that we can be free and we do this by proudly wearing our poppies. Many churches this November will be emulating the display of ceramic poppies that festooned the Tower of London with their own representation of *In Flanders field the poppies blow, between the crosses, row on row...*We are doing this to remind ourselves and to help the whole community celebrate the sacrifice of human life all those years ago. Each of us has a part to play in keeping the peace in our world, in as far as it is possible be at peace with one another. If we come to church but are at odds with our brother or sister we should leave and make up with them. As followers of Jesus, as his disciples we have a duty too to remember his sacrifice, the one man who laid down his life so that we can all be forgiven.

#### **Editor's Extras**

Feeling refreshed after the holiday season? Ready for a new year of activity in our Church? We have had Harvest Thanksgiving, the Harvest celebrated and the giving about to start, including necessary donations to our Roof Fund. Amongst others, there's Remembrance Sunday and our annual Bazaar on Saturday 24th November.

Are all Churches the same? Recently I received an Order of Service from Mount Vernon Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia where they have nine different meetings on a Sunday, covering all ages, and something like God Tock in the week. Their Mission (Vision) Statement reads "Encounter the Hope"; "Engage one Another"; "Embrace the World" - not unlike ours. In Sweden we visited two Churches, one from the 13th Century built by Franciscan Brothers. A painting, which took my fancy, showed the Gates to Paradise on the left and the Gates to Hell on the right. Paradise referred to the Church. Paradise and Hell are surrounded by 8 of the 12 Apostles. In the other Church, a Cathedral, a funeral was taking place, so details of services were unavailable. In a Swedish funeral each attendee places a flower on the coffin. So, different tributes but same emotions and still used by the communities that they serve, as in our Church in King's Park. #### Comments

June—Surplus of receipts after payments made was £269 (£1,496 in Unrestricted Funds and shortfalls of £1,227 in restricted and designated funds).

July - Shortfall of receipts after payments made was £3,267 (£1,176 in unrestricted funds and £2,091 in restricted and designated funds).

August - Surplus of receipts after payments made was £7,605 (£6,185 in unrestricted funds and £1,423 in restricted and designated funds).

The programme will feature mountains (Land of the Mountain and the Flood, Wild Mountain Thyme), islands (Skye Boat Song, Eriskay Love Lilt), films (Local Hero, Brave) and a healthy dose of Scottish dances to send you home with your feet tapping! #### THE ROOF FUND (2018)

In 2013, the Church of Scotland quinquennial property report relating to our church and halls highlighted that, within 5 years our hall roofs would probably reach the end of their lifespan (65 years from original construction date). In 2016 we instructed a building surveyor to look at the roof in detail and his report confirmed that the roofs were in need of replacement, sooner rather than later.

Anyone who has ventured into the large hall and associated corridors, or has entered the vestibule to the halls, will have seen the large number of buckets - deployed to catch incoming rainwater through the roof. This has been occurring for some time now and is starting to affect the use made of our hall accommodation. In the last few weeks, we have received quotes for the replacement work, submitted by suitably qualified contractors, ranging from £60,000 to £100,000!

This is the first major challenge we have encountered with our buildings since the development of the new hall complex in the early 90s – so we have been very fortunate in that regard. We haven't done anything wrong – it's not a lack of maintenance or mismanagement – it's just that the building components no longer do what they're supposed to do!

God has given us this church and with it, the responsibility to be stewards of this vital resource. You and I have a responsibility to each other, to the parish and to the wider community to make sure that the facilities, created by our predecessors, continue to be at the centre of the community and at the centre of our spiritual life, here in King's Park.

**It's a lot of money!** - We need to dig deep to raise this level of cash. Every member needs to prayerfully consider the situation we find ourselves in and commit to supporting our church by responding as generously as possible to this urgent appeal.

There is a gift envelope with this issue of the magazine – please use it and return it when you can, taking the opportunity to claim gift aid, if that's applicable to you. Over the next few months, we encourage every member and friend of King's Park to support any future fund raising venture or event which comes along to raise cash for the "roof fund".

As this appeal proceeds, we are investigating the availability of grants or funding from the Church of Scotland and from other financial trusts that exist in this very competitive market. But, I would reiterate that, in the first instance, it is you and I, as members of King's Park Church, who have the power to allow us to continue God's Mission in the future, as his followers, in "sharing God's love by reaching out to others", in the parish, in our community and further afield.

#### **CO-OPERATIVE FUNERALCARE BAND**

#### **FIRE ALARM!**

It was agreed at the Congregational Board that instructions should be available to those using Church premises, including private lets, regarding the action in event of fire including the Assembly Points. These are currently available on the wall of the halls, but it was felt further emphasis was required. The fire regulations also state that regular fire drills should be carried out by the congregation and organisations. This is a legal requirement.

# **WORLD MISSION**

The Saidiana Women's Project continues to do well in spite of a large amount of rainfall which altered planned to unplanned activities. Three out of five Water Harvesting Units have been completed (to irrigate fields); income raising ventures - mainly horticultural, continues apace as are sewing and knitting groups, health care, including HIV/Aids support and visiting and welcoming strangers are all making a difference. #### LIVING WITH THE BIBLE

"Love each other as much as I have loved you". John 13:34 and 15:12. Love is in all of us. It has been since Adam and Eve. God. made woman to be a helper to man from Adam's rib (Genesis 2:18-24). Verse 24 explains marriage simply "A man will leave his father and mother and be united with his wife and become one body" This was re-iterated by Jesus in Matthew 19:5-6. We all love in different ways, to different degrees; love of God; with a husband/wife/partner; a friend or our family members. This can happen at any age, sometimes in strange circumstances and perhaps more than once. I know, do you? So, what does the Bible say about love in all its different facets? Love's characteristics. often quoted at weddings, from 1 Corinthians 13: 1-13 are detailed, mainly in Verses 4-8. "Love is patient and kind; it is not jealous or conceited or proud. Love is not ill mannered or selfish or irritable. nor keeps a record of wrongs. Love is not happy with evil, but is happy with the truth. Love is eternal, never gives up; and its faith,

through time - verse 13 states "meanwhile these three remain - faith, hope and love and the greatest of these is love".

So, although we can identify and agree with the premise of the above, the Bible relates these to people's situations. In Song of Songs the love is between a man and a woman and is a passionate account of their hopes and dreams through song. These songs have often been interpreted by Jews as a picture of the relationship between God and His people and by Christians between Christ and the Church. Love of God also appears in Romans 8: 31-39, verses 31 and 39 summing up our approach to this love "So, what can we say about this? If God is with us no-one can defeat us!" and "Nothing above us, nothing below us, nor anything else in the whole world will ever be able to separate us from the Love of God that is in Jesus Christ our Lord".

As Christians we surely must believe this. Another love is between family, friends and neighbours. We should love one another because God is love and He gave it to us. In Luke's Gospel this manifests itself through "The Prodigal Son" (15: 11-31) and "The Good Samaritan" (10: 29-37). In John 4: 7-21 at verse 21 "And God gave us this command—those who love God must also love their brothers and sisters". Just as the Bible guides us to the path of true love, it also considers the "distortions" - adultery, divorce, jealousy and desire - 2 Samuel 11: 1-26. "David sins with Bathsheba" and his effort to have her caused him to propound murder.

Love is individual. It is all things mentioned above. It is exciting and beautiful to feel at one with another human being and enjoying their company completely. Perhaps, at times, you feel very close to God or family and friends. I am sure that somewhere in the Bible there is a spark that will help us find solace or understand the various loves that each of us feels.
