

Pastoral Letter ...

Dear Friends

May I in my first contribution to King's View thank you for your welcome since I came to serve as locum at King's Park at the beginning of June.

A conversation I recently had with another minister turned to the problems we face in the Church today. He belonged to the gloom and doom brigade and while his observations were largely true, the note of hope was sadly missing. After we parted, I recalled a meeting of office-bearers in my first charge which was in Port Glasgow.

The Church was a new building and we had the free offer of trees to plant in the large grounds surrounding the Church. The offer was met with enthusiasm and everyone agreed to accept it. Then came the questions. Someone pointed out that the young trees would have to be staked. Who would supply the stakes and how much would they cost? Someone else asked where we would plant the trees - along the perimeter fence or in clumps around the grounds? latter, then we would no longer be able to bring in a tractor to cut the grass. Other snags, real and imagined were pointed out. Then came the final coup de grace. Had we seen what had happened to other trees which had been planted in streets around the church? Many of them had been uprooted by vandals. Would our trees fare any better? Heads nodded. Our tree planting project which had been received so enthusiastically a few moments before was now stone dead.

Then someone asked if we were not in danger of losing sight of the wood for the trees! Did we or did we not want the trees? They would cost us nothing and given care and protection would make the Church grounds more attractive, after a few moments, everyone agreed that, yes, we should

after all accept the offer and two dozen trees were ordered. They were planted, and staked and in the event survived the attention of the vandals.

I share the story with you because we all tend to be more taken up with the problems which face us in the Church than the opportunities. We are problem-centred rather than Godcentred. We focus on the problems which beset the Church (and, make no mistake, they are real enough) and forget to look to the Lord of the Church.

The present vacancy at King's Park, when questions about the future shape of the Church in our area of the city hang in the air, brings home to us that these are uncertain times for us all in the Church of Scotland. The problems which face us can't be denied. Nevertheless, now is the time to look to the future in a spirit of hope, while making sure that we are faithful in coming together for worship, attentive to what God is saying to us at this time through His Word, prayerful, and diligent in our service of Christ, of the congregation, of one another, and of the community in which we are placed. It would be easy to look at the past through rose-tinted spectacles, or to deplore the present, but what is required of us all is that we move forward in faith, knowing that God has a plan for us. As the apostle Paul puts it: "What no eye has seen, or ear heard, or the human heart conceived. God has prepared for those who love him". (1 Corinthians 2:9)

For my part, I look forward to accompanying you on the journey.

Wilson Paterson - 14.6.40 - 21.5.19

Wilson was born on the 14th June 1940 in the Maternity Home in Kilmarnock. He was the eldest and only son to parents Robert and Helen Paterson, growing up with much loved sisters Liz and Anne. The family moved to Gourock in 1944 where Wilson went to Primary school. In 1950 the family were on the move again, this time to King's Park Church, with Rev Robert Paterson building King's Park up to having more than 3,000 members, being the 2nd biggest church in Scotland after St. Giles in Edinburgh. Wilson was 10 when they moved, going on to attend King's Park Secondary school where he was good with figures and also played the clarinet. On leaving school Wilson started working at the Co-Operative in the cash office, whilst studying for an HND in Accountancy.

Wilson regularly went dancing travelling around all the local Scout Dances in Clarkston and Whitecraigs, at one of these dances he met Nancy Neilly, and in the fullness of time the rest is history. Their wedding was a real family affair. They were married on the 22nd August 1964 in King's Park Church by the Rev Robert Paterson, Wilson's Dad. They enjoyed 48 very happy years together. They moved a year after they married to Kilmorie Drive where they were blessed with their first son David on the 1st October 1965, followed by Wilson in September 1966, then Stuart in December 1967. The family were on the move again, this time to Menock Road in 1969. Wilson didn't work very long at the Co-op before moving onto British steel in Ravenscraig, where he worked his way up to being an accountant.

The family then moved round the corner to King's Park Avenue where Alistair was born in 1973. Wilson's work in the steel industry then took them south, near Sheffield in Derbyshire in 1976 where there was a very hot summer and a terrible winter.

In 1979 they returned to Scotland to Southern Avenue which became the final family home.

Holidays were a special time in the Paterson family, usually in Balloch or Prestwick, wherever Wilson's parents were at the time.

In 1988 the whole family's life was turned upside down when Stuart had his accident. Nancy gave up work as a nurse and dedicated her life to caring for Stuart. The whole family's life changed. The Nursing staff in the Mansion House Unit where Nancy had worked, organised a night out and raised enough money to buy Stuart a wheel chair. Wilson and Nancy bought a time share in Aviemore primarily to allow all the family to enjoy short breaks together.

Wilson and Nancy loved to go to London to see the shows, particularly Les Miserables, Phantom of the Opera, The Lion King and Cats. Wilson and Nancy worked hard at raising money in many ways for Stuart and the Head Injuries Trust. Wilson talked often about his life with Stuart and freely admitted how much prayer really got him through those difficult times, and how the good folk of King's Park rallied around him and Nancy to support them too.

King's Park Church played a huge part in Wilson's life. First and foremost Wilson was a Godly man. A faithful, committed and loyal servant to Jesus Christ here in King's Park, with everything he did or said having his faith absolutely at the centre of his life. Wilson was ordained as an elder in 1969 and took his responsibilities very seriously. He would have celebrated 50 years as an Elder this year.

He also made his mark on the church family through the Church Shows. The first show at King's Park Church that Wilson produced was called "First Edition", the money raised from this also supported the Head Injuries Trust. Wilson resurrected the Church Shows in the late 1980's, which had evolved from David Davidson's Youth Fellowship Shows. Wilson was so talented: he came up with the ideas, wrote the sketches, even a few songs, produced and directed the shows, and famously starred in a few, one memorable sketch included Wilson and Stewart Smith, with Stewart playing the Rev I.Am Jolly.

Wilson was the Presbytery Elder for a number of years and the Kirk Session always enjoyed his reports because he always finished with a joke, perhaps Presbytery could adopt that policy too! He was Church Treasurer for a few years, the Convenor of the World Mission Team, the Quiz Master at God Tock and Editor of the Church Magazine for the last 18 years. He helped at Messy Church, Easter Code and Christmas Unwrapped with the Primary school, he and Raymond were Little & Large at the Tuesday Coffee Mornings – we never did find out who was who! He was a regularly attendee at the weekly Prayer Group, he came on all our Prayer Walks and helped with Litter Picks. He was a faithful member of the Worship Team, leading evening worship for the last time on the 18th November focusing on Psalm 84. He led worship during Holy Week. He always volunteered to lead the Hogmanay service too. He was brilliant at the Annual Church Burns Supper providing the Toast to the Lassies and the Immortal Memory.

Wilson lived his life following Jesus commands to the letter, loving God with all his heart, mind and strength and loving his neighbour as himself, being a very dedicated, committed, loyal and faithful servant of Jesus Christ.

Wilson will be greatly missed by all those who were touched by his life, his life finding its completion with his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, being re-united with Nancy and Stuart in heaven. May God's peace and God's strength be with us all at this time As we treasure the stories and memories in our heart, of the life of a unique and special Gentleman, Wilson Paterson.

May the Lord Bless him and Keep him, May the Lord make his face to shine upon him, and be gracious unto him, The Lord lift up his countenance upon him, and give him peace.

THE ROOF FUND - FINAL UPDATE

By the time you read this short article, the roof upgrade work on our 1950s suite of halls will be complete. The life of the project has had it's "ups & downs".

We had to change contractor, as our original roofer was concerned about the asbestos roof deck, structurally, and in connection with fibre disturbance. We very quickly found another contractor, Braedale Roofing of Wishaw, who was fully confident in the roof's physical and structural make up and was happy to proceed at much the same cost as the original quote (give or take £5,000). Our acceptance of the new quote and proposal was ratified by the Trustees, and works commenced mid - June.

Time-wise, this unfortunately corresponded with an intensely busy time in the halls, with the ABRSM practical and theory music exams taking place. We were fortunate to have patient Examiners in place, who graciously put up with the occasional noise from above! It has to be pointed out that Braedale have accommodated, without question, all our requests for the work practices to be altered for events scheduled to take place in the halls, from the Pauline Quirke Academy's weekly Summer School and production of Annie, to our own Community Festival, successfully held on the 23 rd July, in glorious sunshine and without a roll of roofing felt in sight.

Our heartfelt thanks go to Stevie & John O'Mara, the directors of Braedale, and their team for the care and professionalism shown throughout the job. The project would have fallen at the very first fence if not for J P Hughes of Soprema, the roofing manufacturer, who has provided the church with invaluable advices and acted as a wise and enthusiastic link between our property team and the contractor. On the financial side, the total cost is £76,666.43 including VAT. Over £43,000 came from the generosity of the congregation and friends through the roof fund, launched at the September Communion last year; £20,000 was funded by Viridor and the rest withdrawn from the General Trustees Consolidated Fabric Fund, as originally envisaged.

The roof coverings replaced lasted for nearly 70 years — we look forward to another 70 years of "bucket-less" use of the large hall, the lesser hall, the kitchen and all associated rooms and corridors.
