Dear Friends

I am very excited to be writing this, my first article as the minister here at King's Park. I have now been here for three weeks and have had the pleasure of meeting some of you, either on a Sunday morning after worship, at the weekly coffee morning or on one of the litter picking walks that have been organised over the summer, and I certainly hope I will get to meet more of you in the coming weeks. I will tell you a bit more about myself in a separate article in this issue of the magazine, but for now, I want to reflect on what lies ahead for us as a church in the southside of Glasgow.

Having just come out of an extended period of vacancy, during which the church family here in King's Park has done tremendous work in not only maintaining what was going on but also beginning new initiatives, there will naturally be a period of adjustment now that I have been inducted into this charge. And that adjustment goes both ways, so I am hoping we are going to learn a lot from one another in the coming weeks, months and years ahead.

As we look forward, it is very reassuring that for the foreseeable future, our situation is a stable one and we do not have to think about cluster meetings or the next stage in the Presbytery Mission Action Plan, which means we can get on with being a church serving the needs of our local community. But sometimes we worry that we don't have this or that, or that we might say the wrong thing, and when I say 'we' I also mean 'me', as I also get these thoughts. But whenever I do, the scripture that I always refer back to, for encouragement, is Exodus 4:1-11, when God is talking to Moses, who is complaining that the people won't listen to, or believe him, so God asks him "what is in your hand"?. God is encouraging Moses to look at what he does have, not what he doesn't, God also then says to Moses that He, God, will give him the words to say, and will continue to teach him.

Essentially, the passage is about trusting God, seeking him, listening to him, then following his plan for us, and again this is something that I hope we will do together in the future.

So, for now I wish you well and again look forward to meeting you over the coming days, weeks and months.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 2024 – The Final Story

As an update to the update in June/July's magazine, we can now confirm that the total amount raised for this year's Christian Aid Week was **£2,535.25**

You'll remember that this year, the Kirk Session again wanted us to give all those who live in our parish the opportunity to support CAW, so a bunch of trusty volunteers delivered a Christian Aid envelope through every letter box in the parish (all 3,111 of them!) which directed people, who wished to donate, to return the 'filled' envelope to the church at certain times, or, alternatively, to Londis, across the street, who kindly volunteered this service to broaden the options for donation returns. 'Normal' envelopes were available at services for people to take away and return to church.

It's interesting to note that the sum raised from the 'delivery-only' envelopes reflected around 45% of the total raised. That means 45% or so, came from the parish, including members of the church family. Those supporters who either donated electronically or returned 'normal' envelopes or just handed cash/cheques into the church, raised around 30% of the total, and the remaining 25% or so came from the two Christian Aid Week coffee mornings on the Tuesday and Saturday, the latter event, a joint venture with our friends from St Oswald's.

In additional to the above, Raymond & Alan's Glasgow Bridge Walk has brought in, through a JustGiving page and donations from family, friends and church family, a further sum just short of £1300 (at time of printing).

We hope to organise some form of Christian Aid Quiz in the Autumn, but meantime, thanks to all who have contributed in any way, large or small, in helping to continue our church family's superb tradition of support for Christian Aid.

MR DONNIE ROBERTSON 27th June 1940 - 6th July 2024

At this time, we remember Donnie as a devoted husband, loving dad, grandpa and dedicated elder of King's Park Church. A real gentleman, who was always protective of his family and steadfastly loyal to his friends. We rejoice in our own memories of Donnie as we let go of someone who was always very generous with his time, his caring, and his love.

Donnie was born on the 27th June 1940, growing up in the shadow of the war, with mum Elsie and dad Jimmy on Annandale Street in Govanhill, before moving to Corlaich Avenue in Toryglen, together with older brother and sister William and Betty as well as younger brothers Jim and George. After attending Cuthbertson Street Primary, and Strathbungo Secondary, and having an excellent technical and logical mind, Donnie went to Langside College, gaining his ONC in Mechanical Engineering, beginning work with Davy United Engineering as an apprentice fitter before going on to be a draughtsman and design and installation engineer.

In his teens, Donnie was a keen member of King's Park Church youth fellowship where he looked forward to nights at the King's Park café, especially after the YF shows, and it was here that he first met Alison. Donnie and Alison were married in King's Park Church by the Reverend Robert Paterson on the 11th of October 1966. In April 1969, Donnie and Alison were blessed with the birth of son Stuart, before moving to Curtis Avenue, making it the warm, welcoming, family home it was to be from then on. In December 1973, their family was complete with the arrival of their second son Donald.

Donnie was a keen member of Kingswood Bowling Club where he served as President and held several other important positions throughout the last 40 years and where he and Alison made a wealth of deep and enduring friendships but although, as Alison put it, "he talked a good game", Donnie could never quite emulate her prowess on the green, excelling more on the administrative as well as, of course, the social side of things.

King's Park Church played a big part in Donnie's life. It is where he married Alison, where Stuart and Donald were christened and went on to join the BB, just as Donnie had before them, and where they all looked forward to the watchnight service at Christmas. It continued to play a large part in his life and where he made so many good friends. Donnie was ordained as an Elder in 1996 proud to serve so faithfully. He had a close relationship with Revered Stewart Smith, who recently dropped in on Donnie to visit and delighted in catching up on old times. His marriage to Alison and the loving relationship they shared throughout their 58 years together had been his rock through the challenges of life, as well as enjoying many fun times together. Never an over-protective parent, Donnie was extremely proud of his sons Stuart and Donald, who don't remember him ever shouting at them. Despite his own strongly held beliefs, or, no doubt because of them, when son Donald decided to covert to Judaism, his encouraging words to him were "Son, I don't mind which religion you follow, as long as you are getting closer to God". He welcomed, with open arms, Jennifer and Sylvia into the family and revelled in his role of grandpa, taking a real interest in all that his grandchildren did, encouraging them, always wanting the very best for all of them, just as he did for his sons before them.

Holidays were always important to Donnie and the family looked forward to their summers in Arran. Always a keen walker, he enjoyed getting out on the hills, bagging several Munros on the way. He was an avid reader, interested in politics as a fierce armchair critic, and in his quieter moments, a passionate gardener, and of course, he loved tinkering with cars.

He was a kind man, treating everyone with love and respect, prepared to go that extra mile for anyone in need, always caring for others before himself.

Donnie had not enjoyed the best of health for some time and on 6th of July, he passed away peacefully at the family home in Curtis Avenue he and Alison shared through all those years together, and so for Donnie, all suffering and pain are over and he is at peace, and because of the quiet faith in Jesus that he maintained throughout all of his life, by the Grace of God, may his life find its completion, reunited with those who have gone before him, and with his Lord and Saviour in heaven.

May the Lord bless him and keep him May the Lord make His face to shine upon him May the Lord lift up His countenance upon him, and give him peace.

And may God's Peace and God's strength be with the family and us all at this time, as we treasure and gives thanks for the memories in our hearts of the life of this very special man, Donnie Robertson.

Thanks, from the intrepid bridge walkers!

Sunday 14 July 2024 – lovely afternoon, not too warm or sunny; just perfect for a walk!

Our start was delayed until Raymond returned from preaching at one of Sandra's charges in West Lothian - all ready to go at 1530hrs.

The Millennium Bridge is the first, just next to the BBC HQ building at Pacific Quay on the south side of the river.

In 2021 we did the 'Kiltwalk' visiting all the crossings, walking east to west, so this time we decided to go in the opposite direction, travelling from the city centre out to Cambuslang.

There are loads of crossings in the city centre; those that are pedestrian-only like the Millennium & Bells Bridges, the Tradeston footbridge (better known as the squiggly bridge), the South Portland Street Suspension Bridge, linking Calton Place and Clyde Street and the St Andrews Suspension bridge. Further east, you've got the Polmadie Bridge, close to Richmond Park, from the Gorbals to Glasgow Green, the Dalmarnock Smart Bridge, part of the 'Clyde Gateway' from Shawfield to the "Emirates" stadium, the Cuningar footbridge, overlooked by the Hope statue on the Cuningar loop, and much further east, the Cambuslang Orion bridge and the Rosebank footbridge, close to Carmyle & Cambuslang.

In between, we walked over, under, or passed, bridges, some famous, some not, which carry roads, rails, motorways, pipes and one or two where only the bridge piers still exist.

We enjoyed the sights and sounds of the TRNSMT festival as we passed by Glasgow Green and were impressed by the legacy housing left after the Commonwealth Games back in 2014. Leaving the city centre and the Green, we travelled, in relative peace and quiet, on the north bank using the Clyde walkway, where we glimpsed excitedly, through the trees, the heights of 'Paradise' (Celtic Park) as we travelled round the Clyde's loops, passing the Westhorn whisky warehouses, St Peter's Cemetery at Dalbeth, and moving south, the new housing estate on the site of the former Hoover factor, until we finally reached our last bridge at Clydeford Road, where we sought the Morrisons car park, for a well-earned lift home.

We had enjoyed the occasional call of "nice kilt pal", and loads of smiles, and nods acknowledging our Christian Aid tabards. We even got into a very deep discussion about why God allows bad things to happen in the world. All in a day's walk. Thanks everyone, for your support *Raymond & Alan*

<u>STEWARDSHIP 2024 - 'Step-Up Campaign'</u> You will remember our successful stewardship campaign last year, raising much needed funds to support our now, sadly, dwindling finances. After discussion at our last Kirk Session meeting, it was agreed that we would dedicate again, a Gift Weekend to support our Stewardship Programme. This will take place on 26th and 27th October and more details will follow in the next magazine. However, we ask you **now** to give thoughtful and prayerful consideration to your weekly giving. We understand how incredibly difficult it is to address the financial side of our Christian stewardship, but unfortunately, each year, our church deficit increases and our outgoings increase and the desperate fact is that our church, which so many of us love so dearly, is showing real signs of serious financial hardship. To help us think about our 'Step-Up Campaign', have a look at the figures are below/. If, for example, approximately 150 of us increased our weekly giving by 50p the church would receive an extra vearly income of £4.452.50 and so on.
