## **SAIDIANA WOMEN PROJECT (KENYA)**

The year 2022 has come to an end and it's always common for people to think the new year would better than the former. We hope such may be true, especially where high costs of living are being experienced, not only in our country, but across the globe. In Kenya, 2022 was an election year, when, on 8<sup>th</sup> August, the country voted for six elective positions, including that of president. We thank God, as the process was fairly peaceful. During the 2<sup>nd</sup> half year, Saidiana activities ran as planned, although challenges of election disruption were evident.

Sewing and Knitting: We returned to normal operation, working with twelve volunteers, nine in production, and three in marketing. The bulk production unit worked on school uniforms to be marketed from January 2023. We are happy to note that besides business, this activity gave a lifeline to the volunteers involved, by providing much needed income for their families.

School of Sewing and Hairdressing: Those involved in this area are mostly young single mothers, some having dropped out of school. Our 2022 class have completed the training and now await graduation. However, on release to the market to be engaged by those who may need their services, it's our wish that we equip them further, allowing them to be as productive as possible for their families, by becoming self-employed. This would require donation sewing machines to some, and start-up capital to others. It is our prayer that in the future, Saidiana would be able to continue life changing area of activity. Micro-credit and Empowerment: Both units under this heading, namely farming and buying/ selling, did well, despite increasing challenges from the high costs of living. Those in farming got good yields - enough for self-sufficiency, and due to favourable prices in the market, much needed family income, in selling a portion of the harvest. In total, this activity benefited seventeen families, who are now looking to the tear 2023 more positively. Relief Supplies: We continued with relief matters such as health, mostly HIV/AIDS related and emerging food security situations. Our society will always have vulnerable people in its ranks and it's in the interest of Saidiana Women Project to maintain a modest amount available for such needs. Water Harvesting: In the second half of 2022, we managed to dig two boreholes in different areas at a total cost if £2,000, slightly higher than planned. In the next two tears we will circulate an appeal, locally and globally, for funds to drill for water at our centre, to establish a rescue unit for those facing crisis in their life or in the lives of their families. Gavin's Mill Gifts: Our priority this year was the cow harvest. Two families benefited from the arrangement where each is gifted a calf. They will care for them until grown and when they give birth, the offspring is given to another family. The original family would then own the cow initially received. This is an experimental arrangement, and we'll see how it succeeds. The benefits to the families would be immense milk for both family consumption as well as income generating purposes. Subsequent reproduction would remain with the family to use as they wish. Added advantages to the families would be new responsibilities, as the nurture

and care for their animals. **Conclusion:** Saidiana Women Project is no longer a village undertaking. Today, its effects are felt widely, beyond denominational and regional boundaries. Plans are underway to establish a rescue centre to save women and children facing crisis; reunite children and families, restoring hope via education/business opportunities/ parenting skills and spiritual guidance. Renewing dignity among families and young adults. We hope to be able to lift people from lives of neglect and impact the surrounding area for future generations.



More details, including the final sum raised, will be confirmed in the August/September edition of the magazine.

In addition, this year, the Kirk Session decided that we should deliver a Christian Aid envelope to every household in our parish, thereby giving everyone under the KP church 'umbrella' the opportunity to support Christian Aid. Well done and thankyou to all those who assisted with the delivery! (sounds like a quote from 'Call the Midwife')

We hope to bring back the popular Christian Aid Quiz in the Autumn, but meantime, thanks to all who have contributed in any way, large or small, in helping to continue our church family's superb tradition of support for Christian Aid Week.

#### THE COMMUNION TABLE CLOTH

As we look forward to celebrating the Sacrament of Communion later this month, we take the opportunity of sharing a photograph and some interesting details relating to one of our church's artifacts, displayed only when we share communion together in our beloved sanctuary.



This beautiful cloth was presented to the church in 1956 by Mrs McIntosh, a member of the congregation, who wrote, asking for the pattern, to a Mr Sarahan of South Bend, Indiana, USA, having heard that he had originally crocheted it. In response to this request, Mr Sarahan generously gifted his work to the church. As it turned out, the gift was slightly too small for the Communion table, so Mrs McIntosh complemented it with a beautiful border and a pure white linen top.

The picture on the tablecloth represents Leonardo da Vinci's mural painting of the last Supper. His masterpiece was completed over five centuries ago on a wall in the refectory of the Convent of Santa Maria delle Grazie in Milan. Christ is seated in the midst of His disciples and is saying "One of you will betray Me." The disciples are shown in various attitudes, some recoiling in horror at the idea, some distressed, some pointing at themselves, saying "Is it I?"

#### STEWARDSHIP 2023

Due to the recent pandemic and our slow recovery from it, our annual Stewardship Programme (our giving of time, talent and money to glorify God) has been left behind. At a recent Kirk Session meeting it was agreed that we need to focus on Stewardship, starting with the generation of much needed funds to support our dwindling finances. After discussion we decided to have a Gift Weekend, in or around September, where we all should consider dedicating one weekend of giving to our much-loved Church and its funds. It is hoped there will be a coffee morning, and an opportunity to perhaps give up a personal social event or treat, e.g. trip out for a meal or the cinema, and, instead, donate the money saved to the Church. It will be a time of reflection and thanksgiving for all that King's Park Church has meant to those in the past, what it means to us now, and most importantly, what it means to those we leave it to in the future. More details will follow in the summer magazine and intimations.

In relation to our Christian stewardship, the Kirk Session also agreed that as well as promoting a Gift Weekend we should encourage everyone to consider re-addressing their weekly giving. While this is a time of increased costs for us all, we know that the continued work in our Church is so important. We are glad to see our halls being let out again to the community and it's hoped that this will revitalise our mission outreach as well as creating some muchneeded earnings. Perhaps you are reading this, realising that you have not increased your weekly offering for a long time; this would be a good time to think about that and simply update the standing order with your bank (get a form from us or do it online), or commit to a little more each week in your Free Will Offering envelope. For those who are part of the Gift Aid scheme, increases of e.g., £5 to £20 a month would amount to increases of £75 to £300 respectively, over the year.

We know how difficult it is to address the financial side of our Christian stewardship at this time, but unfortunately, we are seeing the deficit currently facing us, increasing as the year progresses, and while we all appreciate that the Church is indeed it's people, it is also a building, with halls and fabric, which it is our responsibility to maintain and care for. Accordingly, please do prayerfully consider this now and we look forward to sharing more details about our Gift Weekend very soon.
