For many years, our good friend Mary Smith has kept us updated on a regular basis as to how things are going with the above organisation, which was supported financially by the Guild, before its demise in King's Park, and a number of individual church members.

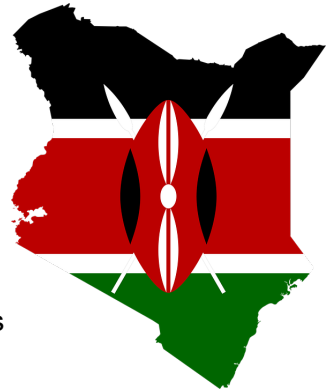
For those of us who are unfamiliar with the group, we have drawn together some interesting information to whet your appetite and perhaps persuade you to become one of its financial supporters.

**Saidiana Women Project (Kenya)**, as it was called then, was founded in 1995 in Matunda, a rural village in the Kakamega County in Western Kenya. A 'self-help group', it began initially with just 21 women, but now its activities and membership are no longer confined to the village but spread across four Kenyan counties. The founding members worked as volunteers with the Iona Community (hence the link with Mary Smith) and were inspired by their time at the Abbey, going on to hold the conviction that development work should be community based.



The group's objectives are: -

- ◆ To increase social cohesion and socio-economic inclusion of poor and vulnerable people within project area
- ◆ To give friendship, hope, and practical help to the community's most vulnerable
- ◆ To encourage micro entrepreneurship as a means to economic empowerment
- ◆ To advance sustainability in food production
- ◆ To enhance families' coping skills – thereby giving children the best start in life
- ◆ To relieve sickness and need in society
- ◆ To promote levels of education in the community.



Check out previous magazines to learn more about some of the group's focus areas – School of sewing and hair dressing, Sewing & Knitting, HIV/AIDS – Rehabilitation, Relief Supplies, Micro-credit Empowerment, Water harvesting and Gavin's Mills....and many more.

Finally, a word from the women themselves briefly reporting on the first six months of 2024.

"Hello friends, Saidiana contributors and well-wishers. It is time to report on our activities for the first half of 2024. We give glory to God, for without His enabling hand, we, on our own would never have managed it. There have been moments of intense reflection given the harsh realities of economic meltdown, severe flooding, and now Generation Z protests against Kenya's Finance Bill 2024/2025. All the foregoing happening within a spell of six months. Our own activities were not spared either, but badly affected in one way or another."

## **The Beginning.**

We are aware of the length of time Christianity has been with us, but how, at the very beginning, did people far from Judea, learn of the man named Yeshua.

Rome predominantly features in historical narratives concerning the persecution of early Christians. Some historians tell of horrific happenings to Christians, whilst others say the atrocities were more local than general. Today, scepticism becomes endemic when we read varying historical accounts of Rome's behaviour towards Christians, so how did so many choose to follow the man Yeshua, and how did they learn of His miracles and teachings? How did it all begin?

I am of course referring to Jesus, the Messiah.

Let's stay with Rome for the time being. Travelling from Judea, say Jerusalem, to Rome was a journey not for the faint hearted. A journey of two thousand five hundred and eleven miles would have been fraught with danger and taken two to three months to complete. A shorter and quicker route by sea was only possible during summer months owing to the bad winter weather.

The overland route would have been by Anatolia (Asia Minor, Turkey), Greece, Bari, then down to Rome. The journey, once achieved and the traveller settled, eventually, in conversation, the question would be asked ..... "Have you heard of the man Yeshua from Judea?" ...

Most of Rome's inhabitants were illiterate. Only the wealthy were able to read and write, they being able to afford an education. Stories from far off lands would be by word of mouth. There was ACTA DUIRINA, a papyrus style 'publication' which evolved in 59BC during the reign of Julius Caesar. Any mention of Yeshua would be highly unlikely, He not being a Roman Citizen. Actua Duirna ceased publication in the year 222AD.

Travellers arriving from Judea had a strange story to tell. The people of Rome would hear of the blind being made to see and the lame being made to walk. Wide eyed listeners would hear of a man called Lazarus who, having died, was brought back to life.

Visualize Rome in the year 53AD. There were no Gospels or Books of what we refer to as the New Testament. They hadn't yet been written. Besides, those wishing to learn of the man Yeshua, had no immediate need for written accounts of His works or words. They had the stories told to them.

There would be those who did not believe. Yeshua Himself predicted this (John 20:29) However the 'stories' did not come from the mouth of but *one* arrival from Judea. *All who arrived told of Yeshua.* Today we have the Gospels and still there are those who do not believe.

Imagine you are seated on a bus and the person next to you asks if you had *read* about the fire in the local railway station. How the effect of that person's words would differ immensely if they told you they had actually *seen* the fire at the railway station. That they had been an eye *witness* to the fire!

The people of Rome *also* had eye witnesses who had actually *seen* the man Yeshua! If Jesus was crucified during the thirty third year of his life, the year 53AD *is only twenty years later!* Some of the people telling the stories would have walked the streets of Judea *whilst Jesus was alive and personally present here on Earth!* People listened and people believed .....*that's how it all began!*

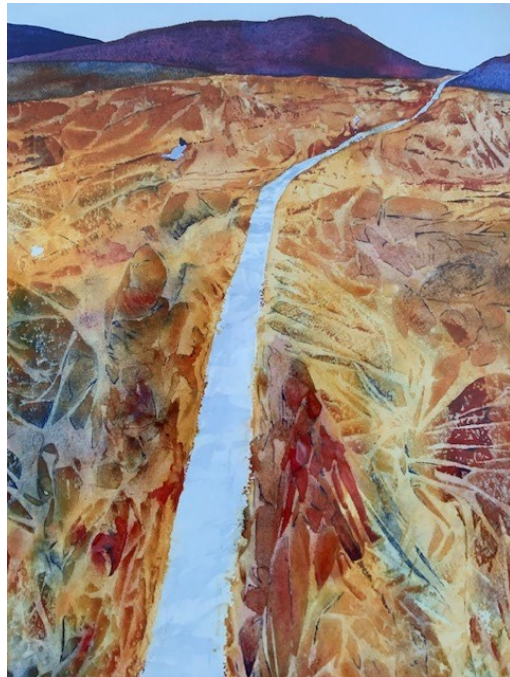
